**Message from the President:**

You'll have to indulge me if this column is a little longer than usual, but it is my last column as President of this wonderful organization. It is absolutely amazing when I reflect on all that has happened in three short years.

It was in the spring of 2004 when a planning committee began to think seriously about a community-based program for victims of domestic violence in the Surprise/Sun Cities area. Thanks to our founding organization, the Social Justice Committee of the Unitarian Universalist Church, we had enough money to file legal documents and pay initial organizing costs. We found early supporters through a series of community forums co-sponsored by the church.

In 2005, a board was recruited and strategic planning occurred. Eve's Place found a benefactor to guarantee rent for a year on a small office space, received its first corporate matching grant and its first memorial gift. Two fundraisers held in 2005 raised over \$24,000.

In January of 2006, the first staff member, Tina Ponce was hired. Tina was literally a "Jill of all trades." She helped get the first Safe House open, ran a fundraiser and worked with the volunteers. Eve's Place received its first foundation grant, a gift from Women's Partnership Fund, and the White Tanks Rotary gave money to complete the furnishing of the Safe House.

In March 2006, the first Safe House opened. It was small and staffed by a live-in house supervisor

who had been a domestic violence victim herself and thus brought some real life experience to the job. Between March and December, 40 women and 39 children received a total of 1140 bed nights of safety. The City of Surprise contracted with Eve's Place to provide safety and shelter for Surprise residents.

In April, 24-hour crisis phone coverage began. The volunteers who answer the phones have had some crisis calls, but they have also found themselves being "receptionists" as people called about donations, speaking engagements and the thrift shop. The "April in Paris" fundraiser was financially successful and introduced the area Red Hat Society chapters to our work. Two poker parties were also held in 2006.

In May, Soroptimists International, Valley of the Sun, took us on as one of their major charities. Additionally, many churches in the area included Eve's Place in their mission offerings. A part-time program manager, Louise Johnson, and a donations coordinator, Heather Brendan, came on board in May; we hired Joyce Ellery as our part time Office Manager in August.

In a three week period in the fall, we held our second annual "Celebration of New Beginnings," a second poker party, a luncheon at the Outback Steakhouse for over 200 and held a two-day board retreat.

On October 26th we were awarded an "Honorable Mention" in the "Service to Community" category of Westmarc's 14<sup>th</sup> Annual "Best of the West" competition at the University of Phoenix Stadium. We also received notice that the Nina Mason Pulliam Foundation would accept a full proposal to fund an Executive Director.

November 7<sup>th</sup> marked the official opening of Eve's Treasures, our Thrift Shop at 103<sup>rd</sup> Avenue & Coggins (one block south of Grand Avenue) in Sun City. This endeavor has been a labor of love for many, especially board member, Mary Lou Stevens, and we believe that it will be a good source of funds for Eve's Place.

Also in November, we made the decision to move to a larger Safe House and hire full time staff. The new

location can house 20 or more women and children. Board Member, Velda King, her husband, Ron, and their extended family put in many hours to ensure that the new house would be open in January. Several staff have been hired for the new house and we are optimistic that we will have a full house by late spring.

Thanks to the donation of Publishers Management Corp. (PMC) we have been able to produce four high quality newsletters as well as stationery and marketing materials throughout the year. PMC is also hosting our website [safetyatevesplace.org](http://safetyatevesplace.org).

In December, Eve's Place received its first gift through the Arizona Community Foundation. Eve's Place has other donors in the \$5000-\$20,000 range and has been given two vehicles in good condition. Donations continued to be high in January of 2007.

Last month board member Leatha Martin spearheaded the second extremely successful Touch of Hope spa party at the Cimarron Spa in Sun City Grand.

My time as President of Eve's Place has been extremely rewarding but also exhausting and I gladly give the reins to incoming President, Velda King and hopefully, our first Executive Director. I will stay on the board and I know Velda is already full of ideas of how Eve's Place should use outgoing Presidents. But my role with the organization will change and I will give up the chance to say thank you. So this one is especially loud. None of this would have been possible without the unflagging support of many. You have cheered, pushed, and given of your time and resources. THANK YOU!

## EVE'S TREASURES THRIVES!

After 90 days of business, we are still learning. We've had a very interesting beginning with Eve's Treasures and are still trying to find that perfect time that we should and can be open. Some days are better than others. So, we continue to be open as often as we can, but still have to have time to re-stock inventory, get things priced, etc. The schedule is posted on the front door but we are open **9 am to 4 pm Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Our Wednesday hours are from 9 am to 1 pm.**

We are very grateful for the donations!!!! WOW, people are being generous. Clothes are the largest dona-



tion item but we're hoping furniture will take over the #1 spot. We need the revenue from the higher ticket items in order to have the numbers we need to sustain our safe-house. Currently, we are scheduling for Wednesdays and some Saturdays.**

We invite groups who would like to come and shop. We have weekly specials of all kinds plus surprises and discounts to add to your shopping enjoyment.

We are looking for male volunteers to help with the furniture pickups. Right now, we have to rely on some very special people to help us and we still need to make arrangements for a truck.

Speaking of a truck – if anyone knows of someone who would like to donate a standard size pickup or a commercial van of some sort, we could sure use it. Right now, we are borrowing the K&B truck but sometimes it's not available when people want us to pick up.

We will be holding our first "Thrift Shop Volunteer Appreciation" dinner on March 28<sup>th</sup> at 5pm at the thrift shop. This dinner will be just for the many volunteers that have helped us make the thrift shop a success. Special appreciation gifts will be given to the volunteers at the dinner.

As a separate "wish list", we need theme items for Easter, July 4<sup>th</sup>, and other holidays. Keep us in

mind when you're cleaning house.

## A RALLY AT THE CAPITOL

This was our first rally and we really didn't know what to expect at a "Stop Violence Against Women" day. The theme was "Love Shouldn't Hurt" and it was symbolic that it was held on February 14<sup>th</sup>, the day the country celebrates love.

Chairs were set up on the lawn of the Arizona state capitol and despite the threat of rain in the forecast it turned out to be a beautiful sunny day. The event was hosted by Melissa Blasius, reporter for Channel 12 News. Melissa introduced the guest speaker, Denise Brown, whose sister, Nicole Brown Simpson lost her life in one of the most notorious domestic violence cases in the country. Domestic violence crosses all boundaries – economic, ethnic, educational level, sexual orientation and religion.

Denise urged us to personally become more knowledgeable about domestic violence, encourage our lawmakers to provide funds and positive laws, include domestic violence in our community safety



programs, and don't hesitate to call "911" if you see or hear domestic violence taking place.

Other personal testimonies of survivors touched our hearts through words, poems and music. Presenters included Christy Moore, Tauheedah Jabar, and Radmilla Cody with Grammy nominee, Robert Tree Cody accompanying her on the flute. Senator Jim Waring was awarded the "Legislator of the Year" and Tauheedah Jabar was awarded the "Courage of Conviction" Award. Tauheedah escaped from a very violent and abusive marriage 14 years ago with eight of her nine children and traveled from Georgia to Phoenix on a Greyhound bus. When they arrived in Phoenix she had 53 cents in her pocket. After reaching the safety of her family she successfully raised her nine children as a single mother. Today she shares her story through word and song. She began to use her voice through singing and writing to speak about her family's trauma. She is indeed an inspiration to others.

On average, more than three women are murdered by their husbands or boyfriends in this country everyday. Despite this horrendous statistic, domestic violence is not just a woman's issue! Approximately 50% of men who abuse women also abuse children. Children who experience domestic violence are four times more likely to act out violence in the community. Violence affects our communities and schools in many ways. Don't be silent about domestic violence!

Eve's Place was represented by board members Marge Clark, Velda King and Vernadene Loveland, along with Program Director Louise Johnson and Volunteer Molly Hartman. We had the opportunity to network and support the domestic violence issue. We had many visitors stop by including Senator Jack Harper and State Representative Tom Boone both from District 4.

All in all, it was a very inspiring day and we're glad that we were able to attend this event which incidentally is held every year on February 14<sup>th</sup>.

## SAFE-HOUSE CORNER

The new safe house is open and accepting clients.

We would like to personally thank all of the people and companies that made the transition phase

from our small house to the larger house a success, of course that means most of you and we appreciate all of the help you have given us.

Our new house required a number of improvements for the safety of our clients. The City of Surprise Police Department provided us with a list of items for the utmost of security. Orion Security donated the alarm system and three-months of monitoring. Rick's Lock Service donated time and materials for re-keying the locks and installing security deadbolts.

In addition to the above we would like to thank the many individuals that helped us move and setup the house: Ron and Velda King coordinated the process, Donna Leinberger, Larry and Nanette Christensen, John and Lynn Rossi, Carol Fuller, Heather and John Brennan, Mary Lou Stevens, Mark Trinidad and Carol McDonald. Without the help of these volunteers, the opening of our new safe-house in January would not have been possible.

We have already installed security doors as well as child-proofed the interior of the house. Steve Martin (board member Leatha Martin's husband) is spearheading the landscaping project for our backyard.

Since our re-opening we have already had women and children stay in our home and are thankful that we can provide a safe and secure place to escape the ravishes of abuse.

## FEATURED BOARD MEMBER

### Jewel Melin

Jewel was raised in River Falls, Wisconsin and attended school (kindergarten through college) there. After graduating from college, she moved to Germany for two years and worked for the US Army. When she returned to the US, she moved to Minnesota and worked for the 3M Corporation for over 26 years. The last three years with 3M were in Austin, Texas. After taking early retirement from 3M at the end of 2001, she moved to Peoria, AZ, where she currently resides.

Jewel's career at 3M included many varied assignments in the accounting arena. She started as a cost accountant and moved into a supervisory role in general accounting, where she had responsibility for the consolidation of total corporate reporting. After ten years in general accounting, she moved to various divisions as the Division Controller. Eve's Place has provided a unique opportunity to be on the ground floor of a very worthwhile and needed organization. Jewel is grateful for the opportunity and for the valuable learning experience that it has provided.
